LETTER FROM THE Executive Director

At any given moment we can see many things at Neighbors. In one day emotions can run from despair to joy and everything in between. Clients come to us not because they're in a good situation but because they have needs, often very basic needs. Food, shelter, health, employment, these are all things many of us can take for granted. Most of our clients have limited if any income; often due to things such as unexpected financial emergencies, disability or limited skillset and education. Over the last few years I've seen them struggle more to make ends meet. Since, the COVID-19 pandemic I've also seen a new group of people. These are the people who've never had to ask for help until now. They come in with a sense of bewilderment. They have no idea how to access services they've now found they need to simply survive.

In order to help our neighbors move beyond survival we've discovered it is not enough to be compassionate, we must act. Many living in poverty say one of the most difficult things in their daily lives is that no one looks them in the eye and no one knows their name. Something so simple: eye contact, a smile, a personal greeting can be the difference in someone feeling acknowledged and being seen. We are committed to addressing the social challenges facing our city; while also affirming the humanity of our brothers and sisters in need. Our services provide increased food security in the midst of a food desert. We remove barriers to obtaining medical care by providing clinics for uninsured patients. We also eliminate obstacles to education by providing solutions to our community's academic needs. Achieving our goals is only possible because of the generous hearts of our supporters. What you do makes a difference, and we are grateful for your mindfulness of our mission. Your kindness allows us to transition clients from being dependent on our services to members who are self-sufficient and can positively impact our community.

Your generosity is the difference between parents having food to feed their families. Your support is the reason students can have a chance at living a better life because they graduated from our High School Diploma program. It's because of your kindness that uninsured patients can receive comprehensive medical care at no cost. Together, we can confront social problems in a way that reduces suffering of the most vulnerable among us. Neighbors remains a vital part of the community after 47 years of direct service. I have no doubt, that with your help, we will continue to reduce the impact of hardship and increase opportunities for success in our city.



Every year nearly 1.2 million students drop out of high school, costing the nation over \$337 billion in lost lifetime earnings.




Our Literacy Program student enrollment has increased 78%

since 2020. We've improved the intake process and online classroom support. We prepare and test onsite, and students have all of their diploma needs sourced in one location.




300 students have graduated from our program and received their diploma since its beginning in 2016.




Hours of educational development support and GED testing provided by our Literacy Program over the last 3 years.




